Unit Title: Festivals of light from around the world

Unit Summary: Students will learn about world religions and festivals of light celebrated around the world. They will choose one festival to research and write about. They will present the festival of light in a visual way.

Unit Objective: To promote tolerance of other cultures and religions. Through this unit, students will learn that there are distinct religions, but that many cultures and holidays incorporate light into their celebrations.
